The Year 5/6 Boys' Football team competed in the CLP Football Tournament at Huish. For a large number of the team, it was their first time representing the school - they did us proud, showing great teamwork, resilience and positive communication to finish 4<sup>th</sup> in the tournament.

The Year 5/6 Girls' Football team competed in the annual CLP Football Tournament at Huish. The girls did amazing, winning once and drawing twice to finish in 3<sup>rd</sup> place! They showed such teamwork and enthusiasm and did us all proud!

Across the last fortnight, an amazing 40 children from Years 3,4 ,5 and 6 have chosen to represent our school in the first two CLP Cross Country events of the year, at Long Sutton and Hambridge. # Why do you think that some children have poor attendance? This means that they don't come to school every day, every week.

Children might be poorly. Or pretending to be poorly.

They might be sad. Might not feel safe.

They make think it's boring and don't like learning. They find school work too hard.

Don't like getting up on winter mornings. Can't be bothered.

Worried about what might happen if they do come into school. If something is too hard to learn and can't understand.

Parents and grandparents should make you come to school rather than just believe you if you say you feel ill.

Teachers might be giving them a hard time.

## What does the school do to encourage your attendance at school?

Attendance Cup makes it all more fun.

Breaks during lessons if the subject is too hard.

Place2Be to talk about your worries.

Friendly staff and places to feel safe eg. classroom and Place2Be.

School is fun, safe and ready for us everyday.

# What else could we do to encourage children to come into school every day?

Individual awards for attendance – termly Star award		
Make lessons more fun eg. more science experiments		
Friday treat for the class with best attendance eg. longer playtime		
Ketchup Fridays for everyone		
Have some swings and slides. Have a trampoline.		
Have a class pet and someone can take home at weekends and holidays		
Shorter days or finish early on a Friday eg. 4 long days and Friday day off		
More fun events for the children eg. parade and carnival. Have a winter sports day.		
Ice Cream vans more frequently. More dance parties		
Class with best attendance gets a treat at the end of term eg. movie day		
Every Friday to be non-uniform day		

We will be taking forward the highlighted ideas- thank you to the children for their great contributions.

#### **Ketchup Fridays**

We have taken advice and will be following all nutritional guidance- we will be using a pump dispenser to ensure the correct amount is dispensed by staff is suitable- this will be no more than 10g, and limiting its use to once per week.

#### **School Meals**

If you have not booked a school lunch for your child, they will need to provide a home packed lunch for the first week of the new half term.

#### **Anti-Bullying Week**

This is coming up in November. Years 5 and 6 will be visited by the organisation 'Standing Up to Violence' where they will be completing an anti-bullying course, learning what bullying is, the different types of bullying, primary and secondary victims and how to safely deal with bullying. There will be activities across the school with the theme 'Choose Respect'. Odd Socks Day is taking place on Monday 11th November, with adults and children being encouraged to wear odd socks to celebrate what makes us all unique.
